


FINANCES

The charts below are the unaudited revenues and expenses for IFSSA's 2006-2007 fiscal year. Program expenses for the year included the food bank, youth and parent programming, and counselling services and the Boyle Street dinner. The YDPE programming accounted for half of these expenses and food bank services for just over a third and the remainder for counselling and the Boyle Street dinner.

OUR SERVICES

Food and Clothing Bank

Between August 2006 and 2007, IFSSA distributed 175 food hampers to families in need in addition to 132 food vouchers in Ramadan 2006. These services benefited 670 children and over 200 adults in our community. As well, families that partake in IFSSA's food bank services often make use of the clothing and household items bank located on our premises. These items are donated by community members and sorted by staff and volunteers at the agency. Unfortunately many donated items thrown away because they are broken, soiled, or unusable. We appreciate all donations but need to continue to remind our donors that only reusable items are useful to users of our services.

Youth Development and Parent Education (YDPE) Program

The YDPE program continues to host a variety of programs aimed at preventing destructive personal behaviour and educating the community on how to enhance relationships, particularly between parents and children.

Between August 2006 and 2007 IFSSA hosted 18 events for parents and youth. The majority of the events were well attended and well received. Topics included:

- Family violence
- Anger management
- Preparation for a successful marriage
- Bullying
- Internet awareness and safety
- Meet and greet for new immigrants

- Interfaith dialogue
- Mother & daughter and father & son sessions
- Career development

Boyle Street Eid Dinner

For the fourth year running, IFSSA co-hosted a very successful Eid supper for inner city needy at the Boyle Street Co-operative Centre in November 2006 with the Edmonton Council of Muslim Communities. Over 600 people attended the supper. IFSSA would like to sincerely thank the many individuals, families and businesses who donated time, money, and food to make this event very cost-effective. Also for the third year, we have been awarded a grant from the Christmas Bureau of Edmonton to assist in the deliver of a Festive Dinner. We are thankful for the contributions of the Bureau. With the community's help, IFSSA hopes to continue this annual tradition of providing a healthy, hot meal to those in need.

Volunteers

This year 93 volunteers from the community donated their time and efforts to help IFSSA deliver its services. This amounted to over 1300 man-hours of time over the year. IFSSA truly appreciates the contributions of all the volunteers and looks forward to seeing new faces in the coming year.
